The actual meeting between James and his great-grandfather was of course touching, but the meeting was also highlighted by the fact that James Forsey had made the trip from England to Vesterlund - by bicycle.

It turned into a trip of 1100 kilometres, where the start of the iron horse, after a trip by ferry from England, went from the port city of Hook of Holland a little south of Rotterdam.

In connection with the moving and historic meeting between James and his great-grandfather, James had been in contact with Verner Pedersen, who is one of the faithful guardians of the memorial stones in Vesterlund. In the run up to the meeting at the memorial stones, Verner, with the help of good friends, had made sure that things looked good at and around the memorial stone when James arrived.

In this connection, Verner has received a message from James Forsey, in which the Englishman thanks for the warm hospitality in Vesterlund.



"Thank you very much for meeting me yesterday at the crash site. It was a very special experience, and after 7 days of solo travel on my bike, it was a fantastic way to end the trip. Not least, it was a great experience to be invited to coffee and pastry with Niels Vestergaard and his wife Lis in their house afterwards, said Forsey.

"It is absolutely fantastic that you have all managed to keep the memorial stones so well preserved after all these years. Being there on the spot really gave me a sense of belonging to my great grandfather. He and the team on the plane made a huge sacrifice for the sake of our future, and it all just became extremely relevant, as Max (James' great-grandfather, ed. https://www.airmen.dk/a014240.htm) was the same age when he died as I am today.

After the historic meeting in Vesterlund, James Forsey took the train back to Hamburg, and he is looking forward to making the trip to Vesterlund again to meet Verner and Niels – and his great-grandfather's memorial.

Pilot Officer <u>Jack Maxwell Whiting</u> was the Flight Engineer of <u>Lancaster LL950</u> that crashed near Vesterlund in Jutland, Denmark, on 22 May 1944. See <u>the big memorial stone</u> and <u>stones to the 7 airmen on Airmen DK</u>.

Jack Maxwell Whiting was awarded 3 British campaign medals:

1939-45 Star with Bomber Command Clasp * Air Crew Europe Star * War Medal 1939-1945, see Perkins.

Here worn by his son David Whiting seen at <u>East Kirkby</u> where his father flew from in front of <u>"Just Jane"</u> used for the <u>Lancaster Take Ride Experience</u>.

David Whiting added:

"I wear my father's medals on the **right** side of my blazer as they are not medals that I earned, but were those of a close relative (my father). He would have worn them on the left side if he had survived."
